STEM - (SCIENCE TECHNOLOGY ENGINEERING & MATHS)



WEAVING

At the end of last term we had Sonia Lucchese from STEM come and teach a group of students about rāranga harakeke/flax weaving. The day started by heading to Te Hana te Āo Marama where we learnt about the Tikanga/protocols associated with the harvesting of harakeke. Then we returned to the Whare at school and partook in the preparation of the harakeke before weaving two separate whārangi or mats that were then joined together with the final product resembling Pukekāroro which is the Maunga or mountain of the local iwi Ngāti Whātua.

FORENSICS

On the last day of Term 1, Level 2 students solved a murder mystery case using forensic techniques. They learnt how to take fingerprints, DNA mapping, footprint casting, hair and fibre identification and blood spatter analysis. Personal confidence and investigative skills were developed as they saw biological concepts being used in real life.



WELLBEING

Rodney College continuously seeks way of improving the overall wellbeing of our students. Since wellbeing has many facets, improving students' wellbeing in school requires a wholeschool approach that considers all aspects of our ākonga hauora (wellbeing).

We see wellbeing in schools as an essential function as adolescence is a critical period in the development of long-term attitudes towards personal wellbeing and lifestyle choices. In order to help us understand and improve the wellbeing of our students at Rodney College, all students will complete a wellbeing survey between Week 6 and Week 10 of Term 2. The anonymous survey gives students a safe forum to share their views about school life. The aim of the wellbeing survey is to give us an overall picture of school life and evidence-based data about practices that could be strengthened. It also helps us review our progress in relation to school initiatives and provide baseline data for monitoring over time.


Please remember that Rodney College is not the place to walk your dog.

The tournament this year was held in New Plymouth so as a waka we traveled down in two buses arriving at 6.00am in time for the powhiri and set up our beds for the next two nights. We played some tough games and all the teams were really competitive. I learnt so much from this tournament. Everything was very well organized and throughout the time of being a part of a new

environment and team, I made many new friends and connections. I felt very privileged to be involved in this experience and encourage everyone to trial to be a part of this waka themselves this year. Also a huge congratulations to Isbe who was also selected to participate in the AMNISS (Aotearoa Maori Netball International Secondary School) trials in Wellington and a huge thanks to my family who took me up every week and made this experience possible.
