YEAR 11/12 HISTORY

On Monday 13 March, six History students and Ms Walter headed down to the Warkworth Museum in order to conduct research into the presence of American Servicemen and women in our area from 1942-44. Significantly outnumbering locals, the army and marine personnel were based in 23 camps in and around Warkworth from Kaipara Flats to the Dome Valley, Matakana, Pakiri and Whangateau. The impact of so many young men, with cash, energy and resources, on an area which was struggling with rationing, lack of manpower and low morale, was immeasurable. Students' research focuses on different areas including; relations with local women, impact on sport in NZ, the impact on food and drink trends in NZ, interactions with Maori, and the impact on social activities in our area. This museum trip allowed us to access more primary sources of information including listening to interviews with older locals who could recall this time period and visiting restored army huts.
