Emma McCardle has been selected for the Northland U16 Girls Rugby team. She played her 2023 season for Mahurangi. Emma will be




presented her Northland jersey at Northland Rugby HQ before their first provincial game against **Thames** Valley.

COUNSELLING NEWS

We are at an important stage of the school year for senior students as they enter the exam season. If your rangatahi is feeling stressed or anxious, and you are concerned, please reach out to us at school. You can reach me on my cell 0273569874, or by

emailing <u>kerry.jenner@rodneycollege.school.nz</u> We will find a way to work together to support your family member.

We are aware that some whānau are finding rising costs difficult and may have a problem feeding everyone at home. Food parcels are available by texting/calling 021 09089333. You will need to state how many people of what ages are at your home, so they can prepare the right parcel for you. It is also worth including if you have a cat or dog to feed.

If you are finding it hard to buy uniform items to keep your rangatahi warm, or dry, we can apply for J.R KcKenzie Trust funding. This isn't immediate, but can buy a jacket, hoody etc if needed. It can also pay for glasses if this is difficult for the whānau. Call me on the number above, if you'd like to explore this further.

Meanwhile, it is important that your rangatahi get enough uninterrupted sleep to manage their day at school. You will decide as a whānau how much this is, but we do know that sleep is extremely important for good mental and physical health.

Lastly if you have any concerns for the mental health of any of our students, we'd love you to tell us, in confidence. Please just text or call so we can wrap around and keep everyone safe.
